Help Denver urban garden win national grant with online vote

With a few clicks, keyboard taps or screen swipes, you can help a community garden in Denver be one of five winners in a \$20,000 pot of national grants from a California vineyard and Organic Gardening magazine.

The East 13th Community Garden, created by Denver Urban Gardens in 2005 to serve a largely low-income refugee population, is the only such garden in Colorado in the running. The grant would help fund the garden's in-progress expansion, says Urban Gardens' Abbie
